Phase 1 review of CNWL contract report to GPs (*South Locality only in response to October 2018 action*)

Trevor Myers, Head of Community Services reported to members; Camden CCG commissioned CNWL to provide 17 adult community services in 2017/18. Following a review of the services, in advance of the current two year contract expiring on 31 March 2019, the findings were that service users were content with the service provided but the contracting element could be improved.

Extended access

The information requested by a Practice Manager and by a patient representative was available with the minutes of the January meeting. At this meeting a member of the committee pointed out that the new GP contract had potential implications for the procurement of extended access which may impact on the timescale and this was referred back for consideration and clarification. There was concern about the huge inequity of use (access) across practices and of lower use on Sundays.

These issues plus a need to demonstrate that the out of hours service is use totally consistent local with strategic objectives suggest a need to fundamentally review the terms of procurement. Patient involvement in this process is welcomed.

But several attendees noted that QIPP stands for Quality, Innovation, Prevention and Productivity and yet all the reports focus on "saving money or "efficiency savings". It was requested that the data should also be interrogated for quality and prevention more should be heard about these aspects at the next meeting.

The presentation on integrating Front Line Services seemed to be aspirational rather than concrete "The plan outlines", "developing a prototype for the future" "the work we will do", Lots of graphic. Thin on facts.
